Creating welcome and support for Afghan refugees and our allies..

As our hearts are broken over the loss of American servicemen and women who gave their lives for the safety of Americans and Afghans yesterday, and the Afghani people who lost their lives. And as we witness another painful war-ending evacuation of a long occupation where we question the outcomes, we can do our best to welcome the stranger into our midst as Jesus describes in Matthew 25.

Last night several of our parishioners attended the Town Hall for Lutheran Social Services of the National Capitol Area, which is working in a public/private shared effort to bring refugees from around the world into the United States. The funds from Congress are never enough and these shared efforts are our current best solution. This program only succeeds when it relies upon our contributions and volunteering assistance.

These public/private ventures are common with many other organizations as well. Lutheran Social Services, like our own Episcopal Relief and Development has been able to maintain high standards of sustainability and accountability throughout such efforts.

What I heard clearly last night was that there is an overwhelming desire to support refugee families and allies coming into this area, such that LSS and LRS (Lutheran Refugee Services) are a bit overwhelmed by the requests for support, thankfully. That the needs of this situation were different because of the immigrant status that isn't able to be verified as the rapid evacuation took place. As a result, many of the immigrants currently don't qualify for SIV (Special Immigrant Visa) that the release of federal funds require. Thus, for now, until Congress can make an exception, such public/private ventures are largely dependent upon private funding from individuals and corporations.

How can we best help right now?

- Gift cards help families to purchase goods they need to establish a sense of home.
 Major chain grocery stores and department stores are a huge help: (Giant gift cards, Target, Bed Bath and Beyond)—we will accept these in the Church Office, in offering baskets at services.
- Donate a gift of any size for refugees (https://lssnca.org/take_action/donate-afghan-allies.html)
- Act. Offer transportation or assemble welcome home gift boxes

- Start a fundraiser, donate funds through the website: Issnca.org
- Sponsor families as a congregation—I would like us to set a goal of sponsoring 2 families for five years to begin our support journey.
- Go through the process of becoming a foster home—(can take up to 3 months for approval process, background checks and training)
- Help set up homes for families
- Purchase student supplies
- Housing of families in homes works best if the refugee family can have private spaces and entrances, a shared kitchen is okay.
- Help find jobs for refugees.
- Become a virtual mentor.
- Volunteer to help administer volunteers.
- Pray and be supportive for the long haul.

Needed items and how to donate:

• Furniture for a totally empty house (i.e., bedrooms, dining room, living room, study, outdoor). Please call Nasrine to set up a time to pick up items from your home.

- Household items for an empty house: Bedding (sheets, pillowcases, and blankets Dining (tablecloths, napkins, cutlery, silverware, serving utensils, bowls/platters, dishes, cups), Kitchen (pots, pans, utensils, small appliances, dishtowels)
- Other household items (clocks, ashtrays, vases, knick-knacks, curtains, small rugs, lamps)
- **School supplies** (notebooks, dictionaries, pens, pencils, rulers, sharpeners, magnifying glasses, crayons, graph paper, maps, etc.)
- Toys, games
