### From the Rector

Phew! 2021 required regular adaptations to pandemic patterns. Just when we thought the vaccines would free us, Delta, then Omicron variants followed. The gift was that we stayed nimble as a congregation, adjusting service times as needed to better suit outdoor services, and creating ways for non-contact worship participation. From preaching on the back of a pickup truck, to outdoor Easter and Pentecost festival celebrations, parish picnics and retreat, connections still took place amid all the isolation.

Thanks to Randy McGuire's continued efforts we were able to substantially improve our capacity to share worship via livestream on Facebook and YouTube platforms. Randy spent many off-time hours threading new cabling into attic and in-between spaces, setting up systems that allow those who couldn't join to be deeply a part of Christ's ministry through Holy Comforter. Also, thanks to your financial contributions, we have strengthened many of our connections.

In spite of Covid, we have had many new members join our congregation this past year who have gotten involved with so many ministries. Some former parishioners have rejoined our congregation, getting involved in our online life even though they now live at a distance. Our "building" now includes virtual meeting rooms along with our physical spaces and we are a hybrid congregation. The incarnation means that God took on human form and the sacrament of presence is particularly important. We learned the depth of a conversation online can be transformative—both support the ministry of Christ at Holy Comforter.

Our welcome and support of two refugee families from Afghanistan has been a ministry of great privilege. After praying over the need, I was surprised to hear from Amy Brown, that her goddaughter had a friend from Kabul whose families were struggling living in the Fort Bliss, TX camp. Through your generosity and many incredible commitments of time, energy, and talent, our families continue to become better rooted here. Two family members currently have employment outside the home and others are actively pursuing employment. Thanks especially to Melanie Gray of Christ Church, Alexandria, whose support was critical in navigating the early days.

Our website received a refresh this year thanks to the support of Lizzy Becker, Elys McLean, Patti Boerger, and Ann Gillespie. It is a beautiful online "front door" for those who are new, and is a support for our continued ministry formation. ECW and Pennywise continue to contribute substantially to our shared ministry thanks to the efforts and love of so many—please consider volunteering for our thrift shop that creates affordable goods and clothing and contributes to many outreach efforts. This was the beginning to our year of celebration for our 125th Anniversary which had been deferred from 2020. We look forward to further celebrations of Holy Comforter's vitality in the past and looking ahead to a promising future. I give particular thanks for Judie Fister's wonderful guidance of this ministry.

This year has also included much planning, learning and preparing to have a smaller-sized Capital Campaign for our 125th Anniversary. We look forward to retiring the debt of \$800K, reducing our carbon footprint through a substantial solarization project (aided by a major gift), and creating a new space for choir rehearsals as they have outgrown their current space in the undercroft/office area. A "reach" goal will include funds for invited guests to teach/speak in our Ministry Center. We will gain feedback on these goals as we move forward with the listening phase of our campaign.

I am so grateful for having worked closely with our wardens Kari Govan, as our Sr. warden, and Jason Crum, Jr. Warden. Both were positive, faithful and effective leaders who enjoy serving our marvelous congregation.

We continue to have a wonderful staff that is extremely thoughtful and caring towards all, being a resource for our common life in this congregation. I am deeply grateful for our clergy team, each with uniquely different preaching styles and yet each remarkable. Ann+ does so much in strengthening our common life: sharing leadership and pastoral ministry, creating a transformative space for spirituality and wellness, and bringing excellence in preaching and liturgy. Jackie+'s share in pastoral ministry and preaching is a joy. All of us are helped by Peggy Miller, our Parish Administrator, for her intelligence and diligence; for Liz Bleich who ably assists her and pastorally cares for all who call in seeking help. David Kelley's excellence in choral conducting, liturgy, and music regularly energizes our spirits. Denis McMullan's love and concern for our shared youth ministry is a true gift. Tom Gadell's well-executed building management and Victor Hernandes' faithful and humorous style make our spaces shine. Brynn Pacitti's decision to continue developing our teaching teams for children and curriculum is done with such thoughtfulness. And Elys McLean regularly creates communications that are beautiful and reflective of so much good ministry that is taking place here. Patti Boerger returned to her work in communications after excellent support of our nursery.

All of the ministries you support make our congregation a vital place to meet the risen Christ day after day. Thanks be to God for the privilege of serving and leading among you for the one who loved us first.






Parishioners shared video testimonials telling why they love the Shrine Mont All-Parish Retreat.
