A: Learn by Doing/Action

Try exploring a self-guided <u>Black history driving tour</u> in Alexandria. Learn about local historic sites as you steer through eight different locations.

Walk through "Men of Change: Taking it to the Streets," an outdoor <u>exhibit</u> dedicated to prominent Black leaders and thinkers, from historic figures (James Baldwin, Bayard Rustin) to modern celebrities (LeBron James, Kendrick Lamar).

B: Learn by Watching

Join the **BBC Book and Movie Club** on February 21st at 7:00 to discuss <u>Passing</u> (streaming on Netflix), based on the 1929 novel by Nella Larsen. Irene Redfield, a light-skinned black woman living in Harlem, meets a childhood friend, Clare Bellew, by chance at a hotel in New York City. While Irene is African American and is married to a black doctor, Clare "passes" as white and has married a wealthy deeply racist white man from Chicago. As the two women reconnect, they become increasingly involved in each other's lives and insecurities.
